Letter from our Rector, Rev. Steve Stewart:

The last time I wrote an article for this magazine, for the February edition, Covid restrictions were due to be lifted, and we hoped to get back to a sense of something a little bit more like normality. Little did we know that as I now write, the Russians would be waging war in the Ukraine. With our TV screens and social media inundated with images of fleeing refugees and the destruction of everything from airports to children and maternity hospitals, bringing the spectre of escalation to full out war in Europe, our current anxiety levels may well be exceeding those felt during the heights of the pandemic.

The question is, how do we cope with this emotionally? In the utterly destabilising and disturbing times in which we live, I turn to the certainties of Jesus Christ and the love of God. And I thank God that faith in Jesus Christ is not something (contrary to popular myth) rooted in a desperate wish for something better, but in the phenomenally well-attested historical certainties of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth. The documentary, archaeological and other forensic evidence supporting the account of Jesus in the Gospels is overwhelming. It is these certainties, and not our emotions, which are the root of the Christian faith.

In each of the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, what they are explicit about presenting is eyewitness testimony to the things which they saw, touched and heard regarding Jesus. And what the Bible reveals to us above all things is that God loves us and longs for us to enter into a relationship with us – a relationship made possible through the cross of Jesus Christ.

And in these most disturbing days of lies, we can find great comfort, certain hope, and concrete truth in Christ Jesus. FREELAND PARISH COUNCIL – LISA'S NOTES FROM THE MEETING HELD ON 21st FEBRUARY 2022

Inspired Villages Planning Application

Still no news on this at the moment, we are still awaiting a decision from the planning officer.

Parish Clerk vacancy

As I type these notes, interviews are taking place for my replacement and I will of course update you all as soon as possible with who will be the new Clerk.

Traffic Calming in Freeland - possible 20mph limit

Thank you to everyone who took the time to complete the survey. Our County Councillor, Liam Walker, reported the results at the February meeting. The village was very split, with 124 responses being received. Of the 124, 52 were in support of a 20mph limit, and 63 were against. However, the comments were important to note, because many of the residents who didn't support the 20mph limit through the whole village were in support of a 20mph limit in certain zones in the village such as by the school and pub. After reading through the results and comments, Liam advised that he felt there was a strong case to support a 20mph limit in certain zoned areas of the village and he would be happy to support this. The Parish Council have therefore decided to apply for a 20mph limit in zoned areas of the village, to include the school area and village hall area. As this may take a while to implement (possibly a few years), the Parish Council will also continue to investigate and implement other ways to try and calm the traffic through the village.

Annual Parish Meeting - Friday 22nd April 2022

As previously advised, the Parish Council are going GREEN this year with an environmental theme for the APM!

The topics for discussion have now been agreed and will be:

Freeland 2030 – A Vision – What do you think Freeland will look like in 10 or 20 years' time? How would you like it to look? How will the Garden Village impact on development in Freeland? Come along and have your say and see if a Neighbourhood Plan is the way forward.

Water pollution – do you know how much sewage is being pumped into our local rivers and streams? It's shocking! Listen to Mary Ann Canning talk about our local waterways and what can be done to improve the situation.

Freeland Naturehood – Information will be available from the Naturehood Group about what the Naturehood group have been doing around Freeland this past year.

Sustainability in Freeland – A local resident, Christian Silk, will give a talk on how we can all do more to improve sustainability in the village so that a lasting legacy is left for future generations.

Do come along and listen to the discussions and join in. We look forward to welcoming you!

"Plant a tree for the Jubilee" - tree saplings

You may have noticed that some tree saplings have been planted at various locations around the village. These locations were identified by the Freeland Naturehood group and approved by the Parish Council. The 15 tree saplings were donated to the Parish Council by the Woodland Trust on behalf of the Queen's Green Canopy project that is a unique tree planting initiative created to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee by encouraging individuals and community groups from across the UK to "plant a tree for the jubilee" in celebration of the Queen's 70 years of service.

The tree saplings that have been planted are a mixture of hazel, hawthorn and crab apple and it would be really lovely if the residents whose properties are next to the trees could nurture the trees by keeping them well watered and just generally tended. The saplings are 20-60cm tall, and saplings this size establish very quickly and can reach an adult's head height in around 8 years. The saplings are also self-supporting so they don't need large stakes to keep them secure. If there are any queries about where the trees have been planted please do get in touch.

Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations

FREELAND GARDENING CLUB

Neil Kenny, and his wife, from Larchfield Trees near Coventry came on 28th February and gave an excellent talk on 'Acers - myth busting'. Their Nursery has over 30 varieties of Acers, mostly grown from grafting onto the root stock they grow from seeds. The first myth he busted - Acers are not acid loving plants. What they need is any open free draining soil because their roots need to breathe. He said Acers in pots need to be fed with something like Miraclegrow every 3 weeks and need to be repotted sometimes yearly.

When potting all they need is a plastic pot one size up from the one they are in. Put some soil in the bottom of the pot then cover this with a layer of grit, put the plant in on top of the grit and fill around with soil. Roots can be trimmed if they are dangly. The potted Acer should then be placed in a larger ceramic pot with a layer of grit at the bottom and grit filling the larger pot. When repotting, water with a diluted sugar solution but not at other times. When planting in the ground add a layer of grit to the hole and a good quantity of composted bark works well. They do not thrive in clay soil. Do not over water them. The green varieties prefer a shady site, other varieties can be in full sun. The Nursery does not sell by mail order, only at gardening shows.

There has been a change of speaker, from the programme cards, at the meeting on Monday 28th March at 7.30pm in Freeland Hall. Andrew Mikolaski will now give a talk on 'Practical Pots'. Mary Fenton will now come on Monday 23rd May instead. Howard Drury, a favourite speaker, is coming on Monday 25th April at 7.30pm, in Freeland Hall, to test our horticultural knowledge with 'A Musical Garden Quiz', which should be fun! A Hamper Raffle will take place at the April meeting. Items for the hampers can be left at Caroline Taylor's house, Old Upper Farm on the corner of Broadmarsh Lane, nearest to the Church.

Don't forget to take your current Gardening Club programme card when buying plants to get a 10% discount.

There is a sale of Plants and Gardening Items at every Hall meeting.

Jobs to be done presently involve weeding, planting veg and flower seeds, lawn mowing and generally preparing beds for summer bedding and produce. Apple and pear trees should be pruned and planting of bare root plants.

At the Committee meeting on 16th March we shall be discussing whether to restart the Day Coach Outings again.

Visitors and new members very welcome at all meetings.



The third instalment from Mrs Bunyan's memories of her village at war time continue...

MY VILLAGE IN WARTIME by Mrs Barbara Bunyan

Signs of war became even more evident as convoys of army lorries full of soldiers hanging at the back of them, hurtled down through the village roads to and from the camps.

I remember riding my bicycle along the village road to collect stamps from Mrs. Timms at the Post Office in her house, passing through long columns of soldiers marching in single file on both sides of the road. Not an experience I enjoyed for I was a very shy child and did not feel safe even in the daylight.

Another sign of war in the village was the appearance of large stacks of thousand pounder bombs placed at intervals on the grass verges from the village green all the way to the A40 main road near the Evenlode pub. They were there throughout the war years, and we did not see any army personnel at any time loading up these bombs for active use.

Overnight a group of evacuees, mainly women and children, arrived and were housed in the old black wooden hut next to our school. The hut served the village as a community hub, for all kinds of events, meetings, plays and social groups.

Miss Hill who lived in the Rectory by the church was, I believe, 'Rehabilitation Officer' for the village and was often seen riding her bicycle around dressed distinctly in masculine attire – breeches, tweed jacket, trilby hat and long woollen socks to the knee - odd for a woman; trés formidable!

Word soon spread that the newcomers had arrived from the blitzed dockland zones of East London and needed clothes, cooking utensils, blankets and food items - all kinds of help for everyday living. I cannot remember how long they stayed as the hut was unsuitable as accommodation and for day to day living. The children were very young, and I do remember two little girls, twins possibly, joining our class in school and playing with them in our playground.

Airplanes were overhead daily and with my father, I got very enthusiastic in learning to identify any craft flying over the farm. Like cars, aircraft were very distinctive in style and design. Today (2019), cars mainly look the same to me, except possibly in colour.

Talking of aircraft, there were some 'dogfights' over our local area and incendiary bombs were dropped near Kidlington. We were quite excited to find small pieces of shrapnel from time to time lying in our fields.

My parents worked hard by day farming keeping a dairy herd fed, watered and milked twice a day, the milk being delivered daily in churns to dairies in Oxford. By night, my parents liked to be sociable and often gave hospitality to local service personnel billeted in the village.

One of their closest friends was the Commandant of Brize Norton – Peter Taylor - who was, in peacetime, a farmer in Norfolk. Peter often came to the farm when off duty and went to the local pub with my parents for a few drinks, leaving his driver / batman in charge of his vehicle parked in front of our house and at the same time, keeping an eye on us children in the house. The batman used to stand as if on guard outside and we, as children, sat on the windowsill chatting away with him until the parents came back. How different this would seem today. Sometimes Peter's wife, Brenda, would visit for she lived with her family in a neighbouring village. At Christmas time my parents would deliver one of their biggest turkeys to Brize Norton at the request of Peter and his fellow officers.

Other service personnel who were regular visitors in the village were the rehabilitated army officers who were billeted in the Stables at Eynsham Hall. They were recovering from wounds and trauma sustained during their service campaigns in North Africa. They were often seen in and around the village in the uniform jackets and distinctive bright blue trousers. My parents always welcomed them to the farmhouse, mostly on Sundays when my mother made sponge cakes and delicious creamy trifles.

One special visitor, as far as I, as a young schoolgirl, was concerned, was Captain Gerry Gray, a former headmaster from the North of England. He was a very accomplished pianist and would come and play for hours, mostly classical pieces and without the sheet music at our very nice 'rescued' baby grand piano.

(The baby grand came to us after restoration, by way of Russell Acott Music shop in Oxford, where it had been sent for repair after damage incurred during the blitz at a London hotel. The piano stayed in our sitting room until the farm changed hands in the 1970's)

I was learning to play piano at the time, so I usually sat at his feet, listening to the glorious sounds and admiring his skill and ability. His close colleague, Lieutenant Oliver Bateman, visited with him, but he liked to settle down on the sofa and gossip with my mother until it was time to get tea on the table.

Much to my sorrow, Captain Gray did not keep in touch, but Oliver Bateman who worked at the Stock Exchange in London came frequently to visit, have a meal and a gossip long after the war was over.

We had a good relationship with Freeland House during the war. The house was formerly the home of the Mason family, who moved to another house on the estate and Freeland House became a maternity hospital for the military personnel. Dr Timothy Flew, from Wimbledon, became the surgeon in charge and another frequent visitor to the farm. I always remember that his sister, Joan Pemberton, was a well-known national golfer.

THE EYNSHAM CHARITIES - A VERY SHORT HISTORY

In the 16th Century wealthy people all over the country began to set up charities to provide help for the poor and education for the young. Before the dissolution of the monasteries by Henry VIII this had mainly been provided by the Church.

In Eynsham, the first mention of a local education charity is in 1654, and by 1658 the St Thomas's Bread Charity was already an amalgamation of several pre-existing small charities for the relief of the poor.

By his Will (proved in 1701) John Bartholomew of Eynsham, a wealthy merchant, left money for the education of ten poor boys. The then Lord of the Manor gave land in the market place for the erection of a school house, and the Bartholomew Room was built there, funded by public subscription. The upper chamber of the Bartholomew Room, which was the original schoolroom, has on its walls plaques commemorating the donors of those funds, several of the names of donors being of families still living in the village.

The St Thomas's Charity also benefited from donations from time to time, some of these being for specific purposes – for example 'for ten poor widows', or in cash 'to the poor on Good Friday', but the main purpose of the Charity was to distribute bread to the poor 'each week from Christmas until Lady Day'. Other small bread or coal charities, and educational charities (some a mixture of the two functions) were also established from time to time.

The administration of the Eynsham charities has a colourful history – in 1865 Vicar Bricknell refused to submit accounts for the previous six years and 'came to blows' at a trustees' meeting. His opponents went to Court and made him render accounts under threat of imprisonment.

In about the middle of the nineteenth century the Charity Commission was set up to oversee the functions of the many charities which by then had arisen all over the country.

The disorganised state of the various charities which by then existed in the Eynsham area was addressed by the Charity Commission at the beginning of the last century, when the various educational functions of the different local charities were hived off into one charity, named the Bartholomew Educational Foundation. The remaining charities, for the relief of need, hardship and distress, were amalgamated into the Eynsham Consolidated Charity. These two charities have continued to function ever since.

The Educational Foundation is authorised to make grants to anyone living in the Parish of Eynsham who is under the age of 25 and who Is in education. The Consolidated Charity is authorised to make grants to anyone in conditions of need, hardship or distress in the 'Ancient Parish' of Eynsham – **this includes most of Freeland**, which was originally part of Eynsham Parish before it was constituted as a separate parish in the nineteenth century.

Today, the trustees of both the charities meet four times a year to consider grant applications, but there are also arrangements to enable any urgent applications to be considered between meetings. Algy John Walker June 1922 – 2nd February 1940

Algy John Walker's birth was registered in June of 1922 in the Witney district which would have included areas around Freeland. He was known to his peers as John.

His parents were William (1892 - 1934) and Lydia Walker (nee Wilkins) (28 May 1899 - 1984).

Lydia was born in Winston, Gloucestershire the 8th of 11 children born to Richard and Mary Ann Wilkins. The family obviously moved often as all the children are born in different places. Living in the Shilton area for the 1901 census her father is recorded as a carter and her 3 elder brothers as, under carter, third carter and plough boy. Her nearest brother in age is recorded as Elgie born in 1897. By 1911 the enumerator could spell the name Algy and he is recorded as a plough boy aged 14 on Alex farm, and the family had moved to Cricklade, Wilts. Lydia, now aged 12 was living with her elder sister Hilda (b1884) and her husband at Elm Farm in Shilton. Hilda had just given birth to her first child, so obviously Lydia would have been a help to the young family.

Lydia married William Walker in the Witney district in 1921. William died in the Radcliffe Infirmary on 3rd September 1934, leaving Lydia £191 10s. At the time she was living at 19 Park Road, North Leigh.

Lydia remarried in December 1937, when Algy was around 15, to Lionel Robert Gordon Edgington. He was born in Freeland on 15th February 1901, so was just 6 weeks old when the census was taken. At that time, he is recorded as Robert Lionel Gordon, the youngest of 9 children. By 1911 there is a 10th child recorded for the family, also born in Freeland. Thomas is head of the household, a domestic gardener, married to Lucy, nee Mansell, who married in 1884 and both of whom lived into their 80s. I wrote about Arthur James Edgington who died in WWI and was one of Lionel's 3 elder brothers who served.

In 1939, the government took a register of everyone living in the UK to produce identity cards and later ration books. Lydia and Lionel are recorded living in Lyalli, Freeland. Lionel is a gardener and Lydia unpaid domestic duties – both are serving as volunteers for Air Raid Precautions. One of their neighbours is Wilfred Long – another of our memorial men. This house in Wroslyn Road was possibly a self-build and its house name is a combination of all their names "LYdia ALgy Llonel"

He died at Frank James Hospital, East Cowes on the Isle of Wight, he had been a soldier for 11 months at the time of his death. He died of pneumonia at a time when the drugs to cure this were not fully available. Just a few years later, soldiers who contracted this were more likely to survive. He may not have made it overseas, and conscription should only have been for those over 18. Both Algy's father and stepfather are mentioned on the Commonwealth Graves register. Algy's effects for probate were only £128 4s 3d, which was left to his mother Lydia. His address was given as Lyalli, Freeland.




