Letter from our Rector, Rev. Steve Stewart:

Dear friends,

Here we are, now well into the New Year of 2022, a year when we hope – and with good reason – that we may now be seeing light at the end of the coronavirus tunnel. We all seem to have moved a very long way from the heady days of Lockdown I, which began with the mantra from Boris Johnson "let's get Covid done" and the hope that it would all be over in I2 weeks! The last two years have, for many of us, been at best the strangest and, at worst, the most awful couple we have experienced. Days when the old securities of life suddenly looked so brittle and fragile and the fear of something we cannot see, smell or touch felt at times overwhelming us. FREELAND PARISH COUNCIL – LISA'S NOTES FROM THE MEETINGS HELD ON 20th DECEMBER 2021 & 17th JANUARY 2022

These are the first set of notes for 2022, and firstly I hope that you all had a lovely Christmas and managed to catch up with some family and friends and also had a Happy New Year. Fingers crossed that this year, in time, we will be able to get back to some kind of normality. We can hope!

New Parish Councillor

I am delighted to confirm that Mr Perrin Hatwell of 6A Cuckoo Wood Farm has been co-opted to serve on the Parish Council. Perrin was unable attend January's meeting so will be joining the Council at their next meeting in February and we very much look forward to welcoming him and wish him well in his new role.

Parish Council meetings - change of venue

For the time being it has been decided that Parish Council meetings for the first half of this year will be held in the village hall wherever possible. On a few dates when this is not available (April and May meetings), it is likely it will be held in St Mary's Church to allow social distancing etc, but the Council will keep things under review and if everyone is happy to meet in the Newell Room we may end up back in there! This area is managed and maintained by the Parish Council so permission must be sought before any tree work is carried out in this area, and please note it is **NOT** to be used as a dumping ground. Thank you.

Annual Parish Meeting

New bus shelter on A4095

The long awaited bus shelter to be installed on the A4095 has finally been ordered! This has been severely delayed due to changes in the procurement process at the County Council. We now await an estimated installation date from the contractor. The shelter is being paid for by \$106 developer funds from the 41-house Mear's Homes housing development on the A4095.

Traffic Calming in Freeland - possible 20mph limit

There is nothing further to report at the current time. A meeting of the group will be arranged shortly, and we are waiting for the outcome of the village survey carried out by County Councillor Liam Walker regarding whether the village would like to see a 20mph speed limit introduced in Freeland.

If you haven't already given your feedback about whether you would support this or not, please complete the survey that can be viewed here (it literally takes I minutes to complete): https://www.liam-walker.com/have-your-say or you can write to him at Liam Walker, County Councillor, Oxfordshire County Council, County Hall, New Road, Oxford, OXI IND. Please do complete the survey or give him your views so we can gain a good insight into what residents' thoughts are about this initiative.

The consultation will remain open until 31st January and he will then report back to the Parish Council to discuss the consultation results at the February meeting to ultimately decide whether to give his support to the 20mph application.

Road closures - advance notice

An overnight road closure will be in place on Friday 25th – Saturday 26th February 2022 between 20.00 and 06.00 on a section of Cuckoo Lane from the A40 to the Cuckoo Lane turning whilst the installation of ducting for an electrical supply is carried out.

Pigeon House Lane will also have a **24-hour a day road closure** in place on **Wednesday 16th - Friday 18th March 2022** to facilitate a new water mains connection.

Limited access will be maintained for emergency service vehicles and for frontages within the closed section of road, subject to the progress of the works.

Drainage surveys on A40

I have been advised that drainage surveys and vegetation clearance works are taking place from I7th January 2022 between Hill Farm Junction on the A40 (east of Witney) to the Duke's Cut bridge.

The works are expected to take up to 4 weeks to complete, subject to weather and site conditions and will be carried out mostly at night.

While most of the operation will take place adjacent to the highway, temporary traffic management will be needed in some locations to safeguard workers, hopefully causing minimal disruption and impact to A40 users.

The surveys will help inform the drainage strategy for the Oxfordshire County Council's A40 road improvements programme, which once complete, will address traffic and transport issues in the area.

SPEEDING ON PIGEON HOUSE LANE

Recently there was a dangerous encounter between a cyclist and a speeding Mini down Pigeon House Lane. Cyclists are particularly vulnerable because, unlike walkers, they cannot just scramble into the hedge to get out of the way of a Mini let alone a bigger vehicle. There are new Highway Code rules that are expected to be approved and come into force at the end of January. They will give priority and greater



legal protection to the most vulnerable road users, e.g., cyclists, pedestrians and horse riders. Most motorists who use Pigeon House Lane are careful and considerate locals but sometimes you get the odd motorist in a rush. I have raised my concerns about speeding and HGVs with both Freeland and Hanborough Parish Councils and our Country Councillor Cllr Liam Walker but there are no quick and easy solutions. Freeland Parish Council has a Traffic Calming Working Group that has been looking at various behaviour-changing measures. In addition, the Speedwatch Group of volunteers are doing a fantastic job at monitoring speeding behaviour along Wroslyn Road. So, I would like to remind drivers to watch their speed down Pigeon House Lane and be mindful of the vulnerable users I have mentioned earlier. Thank you.

FREELAND GARDENING CLUB

What a strange time we are living through, but we hope the situation will improve as the year progresses.

The Club had a very successful 'normal' meeting in November with a good number attending Roger Umpleby's excellent lecture and photos entitled 'The Wonder of Wild Flowers'. His pictures were a superb reminder of the beauty of plants and flowers we often hardly look at. He had often photographed the very inside of the flowers and it was remarkable how lovely some were.

Our next meeting is planned for **Monday 31st January at 7.30pm** in Freeland Hall when we hope Stuart Mabbutt, a new speaker to the Club, will be able to join us. His talk is entitled 'Wildlife in the Everyday Garden'. At this time of year wildlife needs a helping hand to survive.

Jobs for the present time include looking after our indoor plants particularly any we got for Christmas. Azaleas, Cyclamen and bulbs last longer in a cool place, but Poinsettias like warm draught free rooms.

Outside jobs can include pruning blackcurrants, apples and pears, and applying a winter wash to fruit trees.

Tidy around the garden generally and cut down dead material. Remove old leaves from brassica plants and make sure they are well staked. Rake the last fallen leaves from the lawn.

Birds need high fat food at this time of year so keep them stocked up. Hedgehogs thrive on mealworms left out in the evening. Keep bird baths and bird tables clean.





MY VILLAGE IN WARTIME by Mrs Barbara Bunyan - Chapter I

At the tender age of eight years old, war became a new word in my vocabulary! Whilst I was an enthusiastic reader from an early age, I had never encountered war in any form before. I was more familiar with fairies, elves, animals, and castles.

In September 1939, I was in Shropshire for a holiday with my paternal grandmother and aunts, having travelled by train in the care of the guard, from Long Hanborough direct to Shrewsbury. There, one of my uncles met and collected me to travel in his old, battered car to Halfway House - midway between Shrewsbury and Welshpool. I should say here that all my parents' relatives were farmers or horse breeders on farms in and around the northern areas of Shropshire and the Welsh borders - a beautiful part of the country.

What did war mean? How should it affect me or our home farm in Oxfordshire? I was soon to find out.

It was whilst walking with an aunt on her farm, shutting up the hen and duck houses for the night, when she told me my father was travelling up from Oxfordshire the next day to collect and take me home immediately as war had been declared. My Aunt had then to describe what war meant, who was involved and why it was imperative that I should go back home before my holiday had even begun. My father, as a veteran soldier of World War One, knew that restrictions of various kinds, such as travel and fuel, would soon be put in place. The threat of immediate conflict would restrict freedom of movement and there would be issues of safety.

I had been at Freeland Village Primary School since I was five years old. I soon got used to walking down our long drive from the farm to and from school and again at lunchtime as I did not have school lunches. War soon had an impact for we all had to have gas masks. These were supplied and fitted by the local depot – Joseph Wood's large garage in the village.

The masks were made of black rubber and smelt very strongly of the material. They were carried in a cardboard box with a strap so that they would fit on one's back. We always had to have the gas mask with us. Each day the teachers would check that we had our masks.

If not, we were sent home to fetch them. Frequently we had to put the masks on in the classroom to practice in case of an emergency. They were stifling. I had been wearing glasses since I was three years old and they had to be removed. Thus, I could neither see properly nor breathe in the mask.

Mode of class changed too. Fuel was heavily rationed and the supplies much reduced. At no time was the heating in the school adequate. The building had a central stove fuelled by coke so during the winter months we were often very cold in our two classrooms. I well remember those snowy winters. Parents put in a request for the children to wear trousers and the school agreed to this. Thus, I had navy trousers (extra expense for my mother) with a green, woollen, hand-knitted jumper. Jumpers were usually made by family members who were great knitters.

School materials were also limited. Exercise books were plain – no margins and blotchy, off-white paper with nobbily bits in the surface of the paper. Every scrap had to be used. Pencils too were plain wooden items with no outside distinguishing colour as we have nowadays.

Marbles was a popular playground game for us, although these were not beautiful, colourful glass marbles but ones made of dull coloured-clay, which could easily be smashed into small pieces. Even so, marbles were swapped for sweets or some other desirable thing to play with. Other popular games were skipping, individually or as a group, hopscotch and team games such as 'farmers in his den'. The school had a maypole. In the summer it was erected, although not very frequently, for dancing and weaving colourful patterns around the pole. Often villagers would hang over the school walls to watch when this happened.

In the next instalment from Mrs Bunyan, there will be her memories of how village life changed at that time.

UPCOMING ROAD CLOSURES IN & AROUND FREELAND

Traffic Regulation Notices have been issued for the following dates and roads:

Starting Friday 25th February at 20.00 until Saturday 26th February at 06.00: The road, sometimes called Eynsham Road, Freeland Road or even Cuckoo Lane, will be completely closed between the A40 and Cuckoo Lane, to facilitate installation of ducting for an electrical cable.

EYNSHAM HERITAGE DAY Saturday 19th March 10am till 4pm

There's an awful lot of history in Eynsham, but much of it is underground or hidden in local houses, or in the Oxfordshire County Council's Museum Store in Standlake. That's why a group of us, led by the Curator of Archaeology for the County's Museum Service have planned a day when a lot more of that history can be made visible.

This will include an exhibition in the two floors of the refurbished Bartholomew Room in the Square. There you will be able to see many of the things that were dug up during the Eynsham Abbey Archaeological Dig that took place some 30 years ago, when they first definitively identified the site of the Abbey in what are now the Cemeteries of the Anglican and Catholic Churches. Items on display will include a fascinating Medieval lead plaque depicting Thomas Becket that was probably brought back as a Souvenir by some of the monks on their Pilgrimage to Canterbury and a little bronze flask that may have been used for storing and administering one of the Holy Oils. You will also be able to see some archaeological stonework from the Dig as well as other finds and coins that people have found in various places in the village over the years.

During the day there will be at least two guided tours in the morning and two in the afternoon. Each time, one will be of the Abbey site where one can guess how large the buildings were, even though nothing now remains above ground, and see above ground the one stone from Eynsham's prehistoric past. The other Tour will be round the village pointing out some of the archaeological stonework from the Abbey that can be found built into the older houses and walls, for the Abbey ruins were a great source of stone after the Abbey was dissolved in the 16th Century. Exact details of the times of these Tours will be on our Posters round the village by the beginning of March and on the Eynsham Community Facebook Page.

Eynsham Abbey was a very important centre of life not just for our village but also for the English nation. Indeed in 1186 King Henry II held a week-long Council here, riding over every day from his Palace in Woodstock. This included the appointment of the holy Carthusian monk Hugh, who was based in Witham in Somerset, as Bishop of Lincoln. It was he who, after his death, became St Hugh of Lincoln. Way before that, in 1005, another holy monk that you might have heard of, called Aelfric, was the first Abbot of Eynsham's Benedictine Abbey and we are pretty certain he still lies buried in the churchyard, though a grave has never been found.

On the day, we also hope to have an event for children, as well as some medieval pottery that can be touched and held, and an I-Spy Family Quiz. Perhaps you have dug up some artifacts in your garden in the village? To help with this, we will have an expert on hand to run a kind of Eynsham Heritage Archaeological Roadshow to help you identify your own archaeological discovery. The British Museum's Portable Antiquities Scheme Finds Liaison Officer will be on hand to look at anything you've found in your gardens, or when walking across fields, or metal detecting. There will also be a Historical Tour of St Leonard's Church.

We were hoping that by the time the day takes place, the permanent Eynsham Museum would be up and running in the upstairs part of the Bartholomew Room, so that some of these items plus explanatory boards on our village's history can be displayed.

It is good to hear that this project has now officially been declared a Charity, but we have still to await the completion of the Lease with the Parish Council so things may not quite be ready, but nevertheless on **Saturday 19th March** the Temporary Exhibition will display many of the things that will eventually form part of the permanent Museum.

The Day is part of a pilot project funded by the Oxford University's Gardens, Libraries and Museums and is delivered by the Oxfordshire Museums Service. Its aim is to explore ways to encourage communities to develop their interaction with the County's archaeological collection. The Curator of Archaeology commented recently "The Museum Service has really landed on its feet working with a dedicated group of volunteers from Eynsham on this project, using the superb archaeology collection from Eynsham as a springboard of ideas and events culminating with the Day."

So put **Saturday 19th March** in your diary please.

Following on from Julie Stuart-Thompson's articles on the service personnel listed on the War Memorial in St Mary's Church Yard, Julie shares research on those listed from the Second World War.

Thomas John Foreshew 1923 – 15th June 1944

Thomas John Foreshew was born in the third quarter of 1923. His parents were

Thomas William Clinch Foreshew (1883-1967) born in Witney and Alice Mary Dorothy Foreshew nee Blood (1892-1959) born in the Aston district of Birmingham. They were married in June 1922 in Birmingham. Thomas John had one sibling, a sister called Mary Elizabeth, who was born in March 1927.

Thomas William Clinch Foreshew, from the 1911 census, was living in Rosedene, Church Green, Witney, aged 28 and listed as a brewer. He was living with 4 other siblings, extended family members and two domestic servants. His parents were Thomas William Foreshew (1849-1926), also listed as a brewer and Rachel Bradshaw nee Clinch b1848, Head of the household. It is likely that with threegenerations of "Thomas", Thomas John was known by his



second name which is why this is the version of his name that appears on the War Memorial at St Mary's.

Thomas John served with the Ist Battalion of the Rifle Brigade as a Lieutenant – service number 245342. This Brigade had served in North Africa and was part of the Allied invasion of Italy which began in September 1943. By October 1st, the Allies had reached Naples and the Germans were fighting rearguard actions whilst retreating northwards. Thomas John was reported wounded on 4th October 1943. The battalion returned to the UK in January 1944 and took part in the invasion of Normandy from 6th June. He died in fighting in the battle of Villers-Bocage on 15th June 1944.

The photo of Thomas John in uniform was found on "Find a Grave", a site that helps researchers by taking photos of cemeteries and headstones.



(Thomas) John attended Radley College from 1937 and was one of three close friends who all died in the summer of 1944. You can see him third from the left in the Cricket 11 of 1941. On the College archive site you can read this obituary. "November 19 1944. In June 1944, killed in action in Normandy, Thomas John Foreshew, Lieut. Rifle Brigade (E), (Hedgecock's-Southam's, F, 1937-41). John Foreshew came from his Preparatory School with a reputation as a good all-round athlete, and before leaving Radley he had lived up to this by representing

the School in Cricket, Football and Hockey. An invaluable member of the Social both in games and as a House Prefect, his simple and sincere personality endeared him to all who knew him, and one of his contemporaries writes of him: - "I have never had the pleasure to meet a more genuine and whole-hearted bloke than old Fishy." He was wounded in Italy in October 1943, and we hoped that he would be spared further."

The wealthy Clinch family who were prominent bankers and landowners in the Witney area had started a brewery at the Marlborough Head Public House on Church Green in 1811. By 1883, Thomas William Clinch Foreshew was part owner of Clinch and Co, which bought out the Blanket Hall Brewery in Witney and owned the Eagle brewery site that can be seen today, which was later to become used by the Wychwood Brewery. The substantial house the family lived in can be seen in Witney, 28 Church Green, next door to the John Welch solicitors who dealt with the probate of numerous family members.

Thomas John's effects which totalled £5082 4s 11d, were left to his parents Thomas and Alice, who by then were living in Guildford, Surrey. His original grave was at La Masure but he and other battalion members were moved to the Bayeux War Cemetery in the Calvados region of France in August 1945. His headstone has a cross and the words: "Lord, all pitying, Jesu blest, grant him thine eternal rest." He was just 20 years old.

Although Thomas John Foreshew is on the War Memorial, what is his connection to Freeland?

DRAINAGE SURVEYS & VEGETATION CLEARANCE ON THE A40

Drainage surveys and vegetation clearance works started on **Monday 17th January 2022** between Hill Farm Junction on the A40 (east of Witney) to the Duke's Cut bridge.

The works are expected to take up to four weeks to complete, subject to weather and site conditions and will be carried out mostly at night.

While most of the operation will take place adjacent to the highway, temporary traffic management will be needed in some locations to safeguard workers, causing minimal disruption and impact to A40 users.

The surveys will help inform the drainage strategy for the A40 road improvements programme, which once complete, will address traffic and transport issues in the area. The programme aims to offer sustainable travel choices, which in turn reduces emissions and improves air quality for all.

STOP DUMPING RAW SEWAGE INTO THE RIVER EVENLODE

Thames Water Utilities Sewage Treatment Stations (STSs) routinely discharge large volumes of untreated sewage into the river Evenlode and its tributaries in order to protect their inadequate sewerage systems from overflowing.

STSs hold Environment Agency permits to do so under exceptional circumstances of very severe rainstorms. But in practice TVU STSs spill raw sewage as often as they wish and they do this with near impunity. In 2020 they pumped untreated sewage into the Evenlode and its tributaries for 8710 hours. This has devastating ecological consequences and adverse effects on human health. Yet, the recent environmental bill failed to make polluting rivers with untreated sewage illegal.

Communities close to the Evenlode river will no longer tolerate these reckless and abhorrent practices. We need strong local support to make TWU take their responsibilities, as a public service utilities company, seriously and to hold WODC to account for allowing developing large housing estates in the absence of any parallel plans to ensure sewerage systems expansion.




