Letter from our Rector, Rev. Steve Stewart:

In recent weeks, notwithstanding delays and frustrations, many households across Hanborough and Freeland, including members of our local churches, have welcomed refugees from the war in Ukraine – a show of wonderful kindness and hospitality to, in many ways, the most unlikely of visitors. Who could have imagined such a situation only a few months ago! And it has been one of the delights of the churches in Hanborough and Freeland to lay on coffee mornings and afternoons so that our Ukrainian friends can meet up with one another.

Welcoming and hospitality are absolutely central to what it means to be "church". Indeed, the word "church" in the English Bible is how we translate the Greek word *ekklesia*, which refers simply to a gathering of people. Of course, not everybody has had the best experience of church, but there is no question that Jesus calls Christians to be a welcoming community – indeed, a family. But a family that is always growing, always open to new members, always open to visitors, always ready to welcome people for the first time or who perhaps have not been part of a church for a very, very long time.

Perhaps you have been thinking for a while about whether you might like to go to a church service, thinking a little bit more deeply about God and matters of faith, or just want to discover new things and new people. Wherever you are at, I want you to know that we would be delighted for you to join us at any of our Sunday services, where I know you will receive that warm welcome. And, I hope and pray, receive an unexpected joy.



VINCENTS WOOD - BLUEBELLS

As this year's display fades, the once quiet splendour of Vincents Wood in bloom now shows the toll of countless visitors. Social media with its evocative photos has propelled this closely guarded, local secret to something resembling a theme park. Sadly, like so many other natural attractions, our sheer numbers and inappropriate behaviour has denuded the very thing we came to enjoy.

When I took over the management of the wood (along with adjoining land) twelve years ago, I blocked off the multiple tracks with brushwood, leaving one, well defined, route through, with subtle signs saying "Shh, nesting sites!" It took 10 years for the tracks to repair from the compaction of feet to become once again a sea of blue. Now, it is again regressing.

Vincents Wood is privately owned and has only a 'permissive right of way' through. It would be a great shame if this access was lost. 

ADVANCE WARNING OF ROAD CLOSURES



The first closure is the section of Eynsham Road between the Swinford Toll Bridge and The Talbot Inn, to facilitate tree felling.

The latest update on this closure, which was originally posted as being for a five day period, is that it will now only be closed on **Wednesday 1st June** in both directions from **9.30am and 4pm** (it was also closed on Thursday 19th May).

Stagecoach have said that their buses will be allowed through the closure.

The second closure is on Freeland Road, in the section between the A40 and Cuckoo Lane, to facilitate the installation of a new water main for a new development.

This will be a complete closure, **for 24 hours per day**, in both directions, from **Monday 6th June to Friday 10th June**,

There will be limited access for emergency service vehicles and for frontages within the closed section of the road, subject to the progress of the works.

The third closure is Church Road in Church Hanborough, from its junction with Pigeon House Lane to the cemetery for gas main replacement works.

The effect of the traffic order is to temporarily prohibit any vehicle proceeding along that section of Church Road. There are exemptions are for emergency services, for the works, and for access to premises which are only accessible from the closed section of the road. The closure is from **Monday 25th July to Wednesday 31st August, for 24 hours per day,** in both directions.



FREELAND GARDENING CLUB

On 25th April Howard Drury, a favourite speaker with the Club, returned with a 'Musical Gardening Quiz'. Over the whole evening we only had 15 questions but after each answer was given, he gave a 'mini' lecture on something pertaining to the subject. Some questions did have a musical theme as maybe the title had a horticultural word in it. Other questions involved matching the Latin name of a plant or weed to their common name. Most of these we could only guess at! Altogether the evening was great fun as well as being very informative and interesting.

The next speaker on **Monday 23rd May at 7.30pm** in Freeland Hall is Mary Fenton with a subject entitled 'The Wonder of Trees'.

The June meeting is on **Monday 27th June**, same time and venue as before, when a new speaker, Dominic Hamilton, will tell us about, and probably show pictures, of the 'Painswick Rococo Garden'. This garden is not too far away and is an interesting different garden and well worth a visit.

A few jobs for the present time involve preparing for our summer displays and as long as there are no more frosts, planting out annuals. In the dry weather these will need watering until established. Some perennials such as sedum helleniums, asters, phlox and a few others benefit from 'the Chelsea Chop', so named because this can be done at the same time as the Chelsea show. Cut the growth back by half causing a bushier plant and keeping the plant from flopping because it is tall. Cut back flowering bushes and early flowering clematis as soon as they are finished flowering.

Watch out for pests and diseases particularly red lily beetle and vine weevils. The latter has grubs which eat the roots of a plant causing it to wilt. Turn the pot out and discard the soil squashing any c shaped grubs found. Aphids on young growth of roses etc can be squashed off with a gloved hand. Slugs and snails can be treated with an organic deterrent.

In the vegetable garden it is the time to sow courgettes, marrow, beans and sweetcorn or later buy ready grown plants from the Garden Centre. Water tomato plants regularly. Many obvious jobs have to be carried out during the summer.

There is a Plant and Gardening Items Sale at all Hall meetings. Bring along any spare plants to add to the sale.

The Gardening Club will be having a Plant and Gardening Items Sale at the Jubilee Celebrations on **Sunday 5th June**. Any donation of plants welcome.



The Witney Out of Hours service

Patients do not need to register for urgent care services.

The Urgent Dental Service is available between 6.30pm and 9.30pm from Monday to Thursday and 9am to 6pm at weekends.

Over the Bank Holiday weekends they are available between 9am and 5pm and also between 6pm and 9pm.

This service is available to all Oxfordshire residents and is for people with urgent or emergency needs only, and therefore does not provide routine care or repeat appointments. Callers will be phoned back for triage and provided with either advice or offered appointments for emergency treatment. You can also **call III** for details of NHS dental practices offering emergency appointments.

FREELAND SPEEDWATCH

This report was given to the recent Annual Parish Meeting: Following the easing of Covid restrictions, Speedwatch activities were resumed in Freeland on 5th September 2021. During the following seven months, up to 7th April 2022, 92 sessions were held with 8077 vehicles being monitored. Of these, 812 (10.05%) were recorded as travelling in excess of 35mph with 166 at 36-40mph, 35 at 46-50mph and 7 in excess of



50mph. The highest speed recorded was a car travelling along Wroslyn Road towards The Green at 63mph!!

It has been noticeable that since the resumption of activities the speed of vehicles travelling through Freeland has decreased slightly and it is encouraging to note that nobody has been caught doing more than 50 mph since 18th January. As sessions are held at different times of the day on different days of the week and at various locations if anyone travels through the village in excess of 35mph they are likely to get caught. Thanks to all the Speedwatch volunteers for giving up their time, often in cold, windy or wet conditions, who are trying to make our village a better and safer place to live.

In this final instalment we learn of the army manoeuvres and as war ends the personal changes ahead for Mrs Bunyan, who writes ..

MY VILLAGE IN WARTIME by Mrs Barbara Bunyan

The village and in particular, our farm, saw a number of short-term army manoeuvres when the lorry loads of troops, tanks and machine gun carriers descended unexpectedly. Our farm and the barns were targeted and, to our dismay, taken over at short notice. The WarAg issued large cardboard notices to us at the farm with the message 'Out of Bounds'. We were asked to nail these to stakes and place them in fields with livestock or where cattle grazed. The idea was to deter any invasion of that area by a tank or lorry full of troops out practicing their procedures. Since there was only one notice per field – later I questioned just how useless this practice was, should the tank or other army vehicle seek to enter that field from another direction? Fortunately for us, no fences, fields or other areas were ever invaded.

Our main barn, off the stockyard, was taken over by the army and a wireless station was set up on the upper floor adjacent to the chaff cutter and sacks of corn stored there. Lorries, gun carriers and other army paraphernalia took over the yard and troops galore were side by side with the normal dairying routines each day. We had a week of this upheaval, and our main concern was making sure some relevant gates were kept fastened and the 'no smoking' observed around the hay and straw stacks in the Dutch barn.

From observation, the troops appeared to be divided into two groups. One group challenging the other and each spent a lot of time racing around the buildings, in and out of gates, into fields and to my mother's horror, in and out of the fir trees and roses bushes in the garden. My mother was a very keen gardener and worried about the dashing in and around the gardens and tennis court. She had beautiful spring flowers, all in bud with daffodils looking their best in large yellow patches. She warned the powers that be if any of the daffodils were destroyed – war or no war – she would get the gun out. She meant it too! My mother's background was of a tough life, an orphan girl brought up by straight-laced aunts, near Oswestry in Shropshire. Happily, the gun stayed locked up. We were much relieved when the whole army convoy moved away to another area.

Once the war was over it took time to get back to a pre-war state. Rationing continued for the home and farm. Animal feeding was heavily rationed which was why we grew root crops to supplement cow and calf cake, ground meal from corn and daily boiled potatoes for the pigs and other stock. Mangolds were harvested every day in the winter months. Swedes and potatoes were added to the mix which daily were put through a giant slicer and mixed with hay for a staple meal. If you did not feed livestock properly, you could not expect animals to thrive, to produce milk, meat and, in the case of poultry, eggs.

In the house, my mother was a good manager and very able in cooking and household skills. We were lucky to have daily fresh milk, eggs and home baked bread and butter. Bacon and ham were plentiful as we had a licence to slaughter and cure the meat of two of our own pigs each year. One main shortage was sugar but somehow that was *Continued......*

procured through the black market! One did not ask questions but bartering and the black market were rife at that time.

Fuel was still difficult and in short supply. Every month we had to apply for our fuel allowance for both private and farm use. Completing application forms became my job as my father had little patience for officialdom and form filling. Record returns had to be sent each month about the number of cattle on the farm and of any other livestock we kept.

After all the drama, ups and downs of war years, routines on the farm were once again continued though, as mentioned rationing existed. Many of our war time service personnel went home, though Oliver Bateman from the stables at Eynsham Hall still visited us but he had lost contact with all his military friends. I suspect that many service personnel wanted to forget the war and get back to civvy street and be with their families and friends again.

I left the village school in 1942, earlier than planned, for eye operations were on the agenda. Throughout my primary school years, I was a weekly patient at the Oxford Eye Hospital, going every Wednesday with my parents to Oxford. Father to the cattle market in Gloucester Green, mother to shop and to the hairdressers. The Eye Hospital was at the rear of the former Radcliffe Infirmary, just off Walton Street (now the Observatory Quarter), in Oxford.

I left Rothesay House School, Oxford in 1949 and after some very hard graft in a secretarial college in Oxford, went to work in London on a student exchange scheme for young agriculturists & horticulturists in the Headquarters of the National Farmers' Union – at that time in Bedford Square. My friends thought I was mad but brave at the same time - a country girl moving to the capital city- one extreme to another.

However, I loved my work. I had already been up for an interview with the head of transport, a family friend, at the NFU. New applicants usually had to take a shorthand test. I was no exception and failed in one word I could not read - 'milking parlour'. I had never heard the term before as all our cows were milked in stone-built cow sheds. However, I got the job and two weeks later prepared to live in London.

I was fortunate for a friend of mine who knew London well was living in a hostel near Marble Arch – one of the London Hostels Association buildings. I got in touch and a bed was found for me in a room of eight ladies, sharing bathrooms and one locker each in an adjoining anteroom. It was very basic, but the other girls were very nice, and we became one big family.

The hostel was surrounded by other badly blitzed buildings and the area near Tottenham Court Road was flattened in several large places. John Lewis on Oxford Street had only a ground level shop, very different from the tall, gigantic building we see today (2019).

The food was awful. We never knew what we were eating and rationing did not help. Sugar was still rationed and I kept my sugar ration for the week in a small glass jar which I carried with me to all meals. Sweets were rationed and expensive. Money for me in London was always in short supply. *Continued*......

I was rather more fortunate than some of my hostel companions because I was able to get a subsidised, fresh cooked lunch at the National Farmers' Union. Two full time chefs worked there, and farmers brought in fresh produce from all parts of the country when they attended meetings. I believe that rationing generally ceased in the mid-50's when life returned to former normality.

Unfortunately for me, I was obliged to leave my job and friends in London on health grounds. I had lost a lot of weight and suffered from daily vertigo. The GP felt the lack of nourishing food and the pressure of being in a large bustling city was taking its toll. I found this situation devasting as I was just beginning to make more friends and finding my way around London but trying to live on a modest salary, paying weekly for 'digs' did not allow for any extras or entertainment or travel.

I returned to the farm and to my parents. I had no job, couldn't afford to rent, let alone buy a home of my own. I was desperately lonely, for the friends that I had in Oxford had married or moved on, so all I did was to hanker for a return to London. Senate House, part of the University of London offered me a job but, deep down and facing reality, I could not ignore why I had left London in the first place. My ambition had been to work in one of the embassies, French or German, but that was not to be.

Thus, a new chapter started in my life.

UKRAINIAN WELCOME

We would like to thank villagers for the amazing welcome that the Ukrainian families, being hosted in Freeland and surrounding villages, have received.

We now have 11 Ukrainian guests in five sponsor homes. Originally 14, but the improving situation in Kyiv together with complications with a pregnancy led to one family of 3 returning to Kyiv on May 17th. There are a further 10 visitors, currently



in 3 homes, two in Combe and one in Long Hanborough, who are a part of our support infrastructure. We await the visas and travel for nine more guests from the Ukraine who will be welcomed to four homes in the immediate area.

Hosts are providing a safe place to live during these difficult times by welcoming people to their homes, whilst other villagers offered pre-cherished clothes, bikes, toys, toiletries and all manner of essentials for children and adults alike. With your amazing support we can offer our guests these supplies from a well-stocked store – this is being well used and appreciated. The donated scooters and bicycles for adults and children were all snapped-up - any more bike offers would be appreciated. Others donated to the fund for vouchers, so our visitors could buy new things of their own, having arrived with very little.

With the help of the churches of Freeland St Mary's and Hanborough Christ Church, we have two weekly community meetings with refreshments where hosts, villagers and Ukrainians can all meet each other **Thursday 10.30am in Freeland and Sunday 3.30pm in Hanborough**.

The children are in the process of joining local schools and the adults looking for work. With the co-operation of Hanborough hairdresser, Sally Dyer, we have set up heavily discounted haircuts, helping the self-confidence of a number of our guests as they prepare to take the big steps to interview for local jobs.

St Mary's and Christ Church management have hosted cake and tea meetings; times to allow the group to grow in confidence when speaking English, whilst lessons are being given to those who have some English, or no English at all. We have started four weekly English lessons:- one for total beginners, one for elementary English conversation, one for intermediates and then an advanced class for the handful of guests who have great vocabulary but wish to be less self-conscious of any grammar weaknesses. (Big thanks to Byron Russel, Julie S-T, Chris Roberts and Natalia Hunter for their support with these).

Thanks also to Michelle Hunt in the village, and Christ Church Hanborough, we have set up a Friday afternoon 'close to expiry date' food collection from the Oxford Food Hub Charity. Goods are displayed for the community at the **Sunday 3.30pm** meeting time in Hanborough. (Any villagers feeling they would appreciate tapping into this too – please do let us know and we will add your needs to our weekly collection).

We raised an amazing £1600.00 through our 'JustGiving' page from donations from our local villagers (https://www.justgiving.com/crowdfunding/chris-onslow? utm_term=6GwGwqjqb). This has now all been used to support our guests on arrival and for the first 10 weeks of education classes as well as essential one-off purchases such as children's shoes. Ongoing, our expenses to maintain the English lessons are about £75 per month and we hope that the village will continue to support us in our various initiatives to keep these going after the first 10 weeks.

Supporting the village raffle and baking cakes, biscuits, scones, etc for the Ukrainian Cake stall at the Jubilee Picnic on **Sunday 5th June** would directly help this.

A photographic record is being made of the journey the families are on and this will of course include the Freeland Hall, where a Ukrainian flag flies with pride.


