Letter from our Curate, Rev. Mike Madden:

Dear friends,

"When I pray, coincidences happen, and when I don't, they don't." William Temple Archbishop of Canterbury (1942-1944)

I sometimes feel that praying is a bit like going to the gym, I enjoy it and I know it will do me good, but actually finding time to pray consistently can be a challenge. The above quote from William Temple a former Archbishop of Canterbury in its simplicity is both an encouragement and an inspiration for me to pray. Since at its heart prayer simply involves each of us talking to God and being heard, and in return each of us listening to God when he speaks to us. There are no special ways, special times, or special places to pray, in fact we can all speak to God about anything, from anywhere, at anytime.

However, as we begin to pray, if we can keep at it, prayer can become a habit, where our first response to blessing is to give thanks, and our first response to adversity is to ask God for his help. In addition, as we pray, as we develop the habit of prayer, not only do coincidences happen, but we can also find that we develop a habit of living our lives in the presence of God, drawing daily on his grace and his love, which guides and strengthens us.

My prayer for each one of us is that firstly, over the next few weeks and months many of us would begin to develop the habit of prayer, and secondly, we would learn to live second by second in his presence drawing on his grace and his love for each one of us.

FREELAND PARISH COUNCIL – UPDATE FEBRUARY 2022

As I type these notes the last meeting was held on the 17th January, and the next meeting is not until 21st February, after the Grapevine deadline, so here is a brief update.

Inspired Villages Planning Application

Still no news on this at the moment, we are still awaiting a decision from the planning officer.

Parish Clerk required, 18 hours per week, working from home

Yes, the time has come for me to hand over the baton to someone new! I will be leaving my Parish Clerk role at the end of March this year.

I am moving on to a complete career change and pastures new! I have had a long standing interest in becoming a nurse, something I have wanted to be right from school age, but was put off when I nearly passed out at a hospital whilst on school work experience aged 14!! But this past year, since taking on a volunteer vaccinator role for Covid-19 vaccinations, I have had my long standing interest in all things medical reignited, and I need to pursue this otherwise I will always wonder "what if". I have accepted a Health Care Assistant role based at Kidlington and Yarnton Health Centres working part time, and once trained will run clinics for phlebotomy, ECGs, blood pressure checks, vaccinations, wound dressings etc. This is the first step in the process to one day eventually become a qualified nurse (I hope!!). I'm very excited about this new chapter!

So if there is anyone out there who would like to work from home, 18 hours per week, incredibly flexible hours with a good rate of pay, please do get in touch with me to discuss the position.

Duties include minute taking, dealing with all council correspondence, dealing with complaints (only occasionally!), and liaising with external agencies. There is also a financial element to the role, book-keeping, producing monthly financial reports and completing the external financial audit, although we do have a fantastic accounts software package that makes this much more straightforward!

This is a brilliant opportunity for flexible hours that can fit around children, or for a person with some hours to spare.

A number of topics are being considered and these will hopefully be finalised at our next meeting. To give you a flavour, here are the current ideas, many of which relate to the environment/climate crisis:

<u>Sustainability in Freeland</u> – a look at ways in which we can help to make the village more sustainable especially in view of the climate crisis;

<u>Local river water quality and sewage works pollution</u> – a look at how much pollution is being dumped in our local rivers from nearby sewage works and what can be done about it

<u>Freeland Naturehood Group</u> – an update from the Group as to what is being done in Freeland to enhance nature and biodiversity, eg Verge Restoration Project, Tree Planting, etc.

<u>Freeland 2030 - a vision</u> – a look at what Freeland will look like by 2030 and a chance for residents to give their views on how they would like it to look and how this can be achieved.

Blenheim/Pye - North field A4095

Just to let you all know that Blenheim/Pye have submitted a "scoping opinion" request to WODC for a potential development of 150 houses on the North field on the A4095 (the field opposite the new doctors' surgery). This is not a formal planning application and is therefore not the right time to submit comments, but I am letting you know now so that this can be monitored. The Parish Council will also be keeping a close eye on this.

Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations

The Parish Council would really like to mark this event but we can't do it alone!! We need some willing volunteers who are good at organising to help organise the day and make it a roaring success! The last one we had 10 years ago for the Diamond Jubilee was a brilliant fun filled community day, and we'd like to do the same again! Are you able to help co-ordinate the village groups with stalls and advertise the event to gain publicity? Then we need your help!!

The Village Hall has been booked for **Sunday 5th June 2022** which is during the extended bank holiday weekend. We hope to hold a "Big Lunch" style event, but even bigger than usual with stalls, fun fair etc on the field! 
Pigeon House Lane will have a **24-hour** road closure in place on **Wednesday 16th -**Friday 18th March to facilitate a new water mains connection. Continued......



In particular, she has been invaluable in smoothing the transition to the new Chairman and a large changeover of Councillors following the May elections last year.



YOUR COUNCIL TAX BILL EXPLAINED

Residents should receive their new Council Tax Bills around mid-March. West Oxfordshire District Council (WODC) sends these out as the collection agency but most of the funds go to Oxfordshire County Council (OCC), Thames Valley Police Authority (TVPA) and Freeland Parish Council (FPC). Band D is the benchmark for comparison; e.g., the charge for Band A is two-thirds of that for Band D which is, in turn, half that for Band H. In Freeland the new tax for Band D is about £2,100 shared as follows: OCC (78.5%), TVPA (11.5%), WODC (5.4%) and FPC (4.6%). The increase in the total tax demand is about £95 (or 4.7%) and this comprises £78.50 to OCC, £10 to TVPA, £5 to WODC and £1.37 to FPC.

FPC's funding need (Precept) for 2022/23 is £68,331 compared to £66,005 the previous year. Taking into account the number of new occupied dwellings results in a rise of 1.4% per household. About 43% of the Precept goes towards repaying the loans for the Village Hall and the attached CRF (sports changing rooms and Newell Room) and the rest is for maintaining village facilities and other overheads. The last instalment of the loan for the CRF is this year while that of the bigger loan for the Village Hall is not until 2035. Find out more at the Annual Parish Meeting in April.

WODC's total expenditure is budgeted to decrease slightly despite inflation in the cost of frontline services and support to local communities. The increase in the charge is to balance the budget and add a small amount to reserves. Still, the charge covers only 40% of WODC's needs with the rest coming from business rates (35%), Government grants (25%), investment income and reserves. Parking remains free and WODC's charge remains the second-lowest among English counties.

The 5% increase in OCC's charge is the maximum allowed without a local referendum and includes a special 3% charge for Adult Social Care. When asked if they would support this, of the 1324 residents who answered, 51% said Yes, 42% said No and 7% didn't know. Taken together, Adult and Children's Social Care and Education (after Government grants) account for about ³/₄ of spending with the rest divided up between Highways, Public Health, Waste Disposal, Fire, Libraries, etc.

Finally, a bit of good news. The Government has announced that all households in Bands A to D (about 70%) will receive a rebate of \pounds 150 from April to help with the cost of energy. Those who pay their Council Tax by direct debit will receive a transfer from WODC into their bank accounts, but even those who do not have direct debit, or are exempt, will get it. 

FREELAND GARDENING CLUB

What an interesting meeting the Club had on 31st January. Stuart Mabbutt, the speaker, had brought a friend who started the meeting playing his guitar 'to still the 30 members and to forget the pressures of the day'. 'Wildlife in Everyday Gardening' was the theme of the talk. We were encouraged to go out, sit and observe nature and listen to it's sounds and what impact we are having upon it. What is our interpretation of tidiness – pleasing to our eyes or to nature.

If you have a pond, submerge a branch at one end for dragonfly adults to rest and warm themselves. Hedgehogs like long grass and connecting corridors, feed them at night to prevent birds eating the food in the day. Grow plants flowering at different seasons to extend the supply of nectar. Grow white flowers to attract moths at night. Most habitats provide a home for some wildlife. Wildflowers need poor soil which will have to be created.

Put up nest boxes, preferably 3, facing in different directions to catch the sun's warmth. These are but a few of his suggestions!

The next meeting is on **Monday 28th February at 7.30pm** in Freeland Hall when Neal Kenny will talk on 'Japanese Acers – myth busting'. These lovely trees are at their best in Autumn with their magnificent colours. The meeting on **28th March** also involves trees because Mary Fenton will tell us about 'The Wonder of Trees'. Spring is a lovely time when the fresh green leaves emerge after the long bare winter.

Tips for the month include; dividing large clumps of snowdrops after flowering, planting annual flower seeds and pricking out those grown earlier under glass, dividing perennials by splitting with a spade or 2 forks, cut down ornamental grasses, weed, feed and mulch beds, and prune late flowering clematis.

In the veg garden chit seed potatoes, sow many varieties of hardy veg, feed and force rhubarb by covering the plant with a bucket, feed fruit trees and bushes and mulch well with compost to preserve moisture, cut dead leaves from strawberry plants and plant new runners and remove older plants.

We are a very friendly Club where you can meet and make new friends so come along and listen to some excellent talks. Visitors very welcome. There is a Plant and Gardening Item sale at each meeting so bring along any spare plants etc. but if not sold please take them home afterwards!

MY VILLAGE IN WARTIME by Mrs Barbara Bunyan - Chapter 2

Village life started to change too. Air Raid wardens and Home Guard officers drawn from the local villagers themselves, were appointed. Wardens did rounds at night to check that no lights could be seen at windows or doors. Everywhere had to have blackout curtains made from yards and yards of quite thick, black cotton material, to prevent electric light from penetrating outside. As farmers, we also had to put up blackout material in the cowsheds and barns and all windows. Milking twice a day, every day took place in the dark in wintertime, early in the morning and later, in the afternoon or early evening. Lamps, flashlights and car headlights were all fitted with shields or shades to restrict light rays being seen from above.

Home Guards were nominated in the village and had to be on duty as sentries in specific points in and around the village, in the lanes and on the approaches to the village, watching for any unauthorised movement. My father was appointed Commander and, as such, had to report for sentry duty overnight on the hill going out of the village from the Green towards Eynsham – a very dark, lonely route. This duty was on top of a hard-working day on the farm looking after the livestock and two daily sessions of milking.

My mother was not a happy lady with the absence of my father at the other end of the village. She made a great fuss with the powers that be, pointing out that she was alone with small children on the farm, which had no immediate neighbours, completely undefended while her husband was guarding some lonely, deserted area outside the village. Another strange arrangement, in my view, was that, as Commander, my father was issued with a large quantity of first aid equipment – dressings, bandages, slings, splints, plasters, all being kept in drawers and other spaces in our farmhouse. As far as I can remember, all these items were still in situ when the war was over. In other words, never used or called upon. What a waste!

The person who coordinated the home guard locally, and shall be nameless, rather shown here as X as I believe his family still live in Freeland. X came to see my father frequently, presumably about duties, shifts and with Home Guard news. On one occasion, I remember it well, when X came to the farm after dark, dressed in his full Home Guard kit with tin helmet, rifle and knapsack. He walked through our stockyard, down towards the house in the shadow of the long stone side wall of the farm buildings. My mother, alert as always, was drawing the curtains, putting up the blackouts and saw this figure walking in the shadows towards the house. She alerted my father, at the same time opening a window, shouting at the approaching figure. My father appeared with his twelve-bore shotgun rifle (under licence I might add) raised it at the window at the same moment X revealed himself by name - just in time. Needless to say, he got a good telling off by my mother who explained to him, in no uncertain terms, that he could have been mistaken for a spy or a parachutist. X never did that again. He always communicated in daylight.

Telephones were few and far between and usually used only for business purposes, but one was always aware they could be a security risk. *Continued......*

People were very edgy. The radio and the newspapers spoke daily of enemy aircraft, parachutists and the possible invasion and likely bombing since we had numerous aerodromes, camps and munition sites in the local area. Hearing aircraft immediately put folk on the lookout.

My father's kneehole walnut desk with its rolled top played a significant role when the sirens sounded or we heard aircraft overhead. The kneehole was the first place to which we young folk bolted as a place of refuge. The farmhouse had very thick walls and wide windowsills so the worst that could happen if a bomb exploded nearby was that the roof would cave in. It was a very scary time for all.

One totally unexpected adventure came up one day in the form of a visit we all made to Broad Marsh, a field on the edge of the Eynsham Hall Estate, where overnight, a Blenheim aircraft had landed and was completely undamaged. Whether it had engine trouble or was lost in the fog no one seemed to know. To see an aeroplane on the ground not far from our school was very exciting and better still, one by one, we were allowed to climb inside for a look at the controls. I do not know how long it was there and can imagine aviation experts soon recovered it.

In the next instalment, war becomes even more evident to the young, former Freeland resident...

A further article from Julie Stuart-Thompson on the service personnel listed on the War Memorial in St Mary's Church Yard

Lawrence Walter Lay 26th May 1917 – 14th October 1941

The Lay family had a long association with Freeland and the surrounding area.

Lawrence Walter was the son of Walter James Lay (born 19th August 1896) and Agnes (born 26th August 1896, nee Drewitt). They married in September 1916 in the Witney registration district. Lawrence had one sister, Hilda, born 24th December 1919, and in the 1921 census the family are recorded in the Eynsham area and in the 1939 Register they were living in Mill Street, Eynsham. Lawrence and his father Walter are both listed as builder's labourers and Hilda a machinist in a blanket factory. Hilda married Ernest H Willoughby in 1940 and had four children, the eldest son born in 1943 was named Lawrence presumably in memory of the brother she had lost in the war.

Tracing the family further back in the records, Lawrence's grandparents were Walter born 1857 and Agnes Victoria (nee Berry) born 1861, they married in Witney in September 1882 and they had eight children. In the 1891 census they are registered as living in Freeland Lane, Hanborough. Walter is listed as a Gentlemen's gardener and Agnes a gloveress – a common profession for many women in the area at this time. Back a further generation, Walter's parents were George Thomas Lay born 1825 and Phoebe (nee Willett). They married in March 1845. George was a stone mason and Phoebe a gloveress, they had seven children. All the census records for these families are in the Eynsham area including the 1851 census when in Freeland, George, Phoebe and their first three children were living with their Willett in laws. Phoebe's father Joseph born 1786 is described as a Pauper, Agricultural Labourer. George and Phoebe are both listed in Freeland with their respective families. George's parents (making them Lawrence's great great grandparents) are Thomas, born 1786 and Elizabeth in 1806.

Walter James Lay (M12196), Lawrence's father, was a seaman. His record, written in Chatham, says he was 5ft 7in with a 36in chest, brown hair, blue eyes and a fresh complexion. He served from February 1915 until February 1920. He is listed as a farm and kitchen hand and received a war gratuity. It was therefore not a surprise that when Lawrence signed up for the second world war, he joined the Navy.

Ordinary Seaman Lawrence Lay P/JX 195566, served on board the HMS Fleur de Lys (K122) a flower class corvette. It could sail at 16 knots and was 925 tons. This class of ship built between 1940-42, were short- 205ft with a broad 33ft beam which allowed them to patrol even in fierce weather conditions. A formidable U-boat hunter, it would give no break to the U-boats during bad weather. Originally ordered by the French Navy and called La Dieppoise, it was taken on by the Royal Navy when the Germans invaded France. Based on a whale catcher design, it was built to escort shipping by Smiths Dock and Co in Middlesbrough. It was ordered on 25th July 1939, laid down on 30th January 1940, launched on 21st June 1940 and commissioned on 26th August 1940. The Fleur de Lys had a complement of 85 and in June 1941 the command was taken on by Lt Alexander Collins. It had several different sized guns and most importantly two depth charge throwers. The two depth charge rails carried 40 depth charges.

On 14th October 1941 the Fleur de Lys was part of convoy OG75 off the Straits of Gibraltar when it was torpedoed by U206. The U boat was captained by Herbert Opitz, born in 1915, he had risen in the ranks and had several awards for his missions, on 9th August 1941 he had hit the Ocean Victor. The U206 fired three



torpedoes at the port side of the Fleur de Lys, causing a chain reaction. The magazine exploded and the ship broke in two. Seventy crew members went down with the ship and only three survived, being picked up by a Spanish vessel. The U206 went on to hit



another ship, on 19th October, the 3000-ton steam merchant Baron Kelvin. At sea for three patrols and a total of sixty-eight days, U206 was believed destroyed on 30th November 1941, off St Nazaire, with the loss of all forty-six hands.

Lawrence, along with 24,851 casualties from both World Wars, is commemorated at the Portsmouth Naval Memorial. Panel 50 Column 3.

He was just 24 years old.

MEDICAL UPDATE

The Minor Injuries Unit

A reminder that our local Minor Injuries Unit is based at the Witney Hospital – next door to the Windrush Practice.

As the name suggests, you can go there for injuries such as broken bones, severe sprains, deep cuts, eye injuries, minor head injuries and minor burns and for much of the time there are also x-ray facilities.

You are much more likely to be seen more quickly than if you go to A&E – which is for potentially life-threatening conditions such as chest pain or symptoms of a stroke. As you will appreciate, at the A&E department they must give priority to those more serious cases – so you may well have to wait longer to be seen.

The excellent staff at the Minor Injuries Unit have all the training, skills and expertise to deal with your needs. And being seen at the unit is easier than ever now as you can actually make an appointment to go there via the **NHS III** service. When you call **III** you will be carefully questioned about your injury – either by phone or on-line. The call handlers then ensure that the patients are referred to the right place and are given an appointment.

Our Emergency Departments are still under great pressure

A plea has come out from the University Hospitals (the JR, Churchill, NOC & Horton). We are being urged to only use Emergency Departments in genuine emergencies as they continue to be under pressure. There are other appropriate avenues to help so please use the **NHS III** online service which can offer good advice on the best way for you to get the care you need. When you call **III** you will need to answer some straightforward questions – but these will enable the call handler to help you accurately and as quickly as possible.

If you go to A&E and it is not an emergency, you need to know that you run the risk of a long wait as they will always prioritise patients in order of clinical need.


